The Association for the Development of Rural Capacities was founded in 1998 to serve the needs of marginalized people living in South Lebanon. Initially, the Association grew out of a loose network of individuals who originated from the region and were dedicated to its reconstruction and rehabilitation after decades of war. Several initiatives were launched informally, enabling the community to implement effective measures that contribute to their livelihoods and sustainable development.

On April 6th, 1998 the Association was officially registered at the Lebanese Ministry of Interior. Institutional funding from international and national sources became available which increased its area of intervention.

Continuous private and institutional support has allowed the Association to sustain its activities, made available to Lebanese in the South through four official programs: Agriculture, Micro-Credit, Social Development and Vocational Training.

The Need in South Lebanon

The United Nations estimates that one fourth of the Lebanese population that is considered destitute live in rural areas and are concentrated in the remote regions of Baalbeck in the Bekaa Valley, Akkar in the North and the area of South Lebanon. Southern Lebanon is divided into two governorates (*Mohafazat*): South Lebanon and Nabattiyeh, which include seven administrative districts (*cazas*): Saida-Zahrani, Tyre, Jezzine, Nabattiyeh, Marjayoun, Hasbaya, and Bint-Jbeil. The region consists of three main cities as well as 300 towns and villages of which 246 are municipalities. The population is around 472,000 inhabitants, according to the Ministry of Interior & Municipalities.

The economy is based mainly on agricultural activities and the agro-food industry, followed by trade and services, and lastly the tourism sector, which began to recover due to the restoration of the area's historical sites.

Economic activity is low and was worsened by the war that took place in 2006. At the start of the conflict the area was in the process of recovery from more than 20 years of foreign occupation. In relation to human capital, the conflict left thousands dead, orphaned and widowed, as well as injured and disabled. In relation to material loss, much of the region's infrastructure was destroyed or damaged.

Furthermore, four main Palestinian refugee camps amid several smaller ones are located in the surroundings areas of Tyre and Saida with an estimated population of 100,000 individuals. Living conditions are very poor and their numbers are not included in national statistics.

Access to financial services and social development is crucial for the poor living in South Lebanon, therefore non-governmental organizations, like ADR, have an important role to play.

REACHING AND EMPOWERING: MAKING WAVES WITH DEVELOPMENT

WHO WE ARE

The Association for the Development of Rural Capacities (ADR) is a Lebanese non-governmental organization (NGO) registered with the Lebanese Ministry of Interior by decree 59 D.A. as of April 6^{th,} 1998.

ADR has no political or religious affiliations and currently works in South Lebanon.

MISSION

ADR's mission is to empower and integrate marginalized people through sustainable economic and social development.

BENEFICIARIES

ADR's target populations are fishermen, farmers, small entrepreneurs, refugees, local community groups and cooperatives, women and the youth from the most impoverished areas of Lebanon.

OBJECTIVES

- Improve access to training, tools, information and financial services.
- Facilitate access to the labor market and develop income-generating projects.
- Promote partnerships and decentralized cooperation.

WHAT WE DO

Since its creation, ADR designs and implements projects according to communities' wants and needs through its four key programs:

- Micro-Credit
- Vocational Training
- Sustainable Agriculture
- Social Services

Through partnerships with local, regional and international NGOs, governmental institutions, municipalities, cooperatives, organizations, communities, universities and financial institutions, ADR enables the development of human competence, strengthens economic capacities and supports civil societies.





MICRO-CREDIT

A fisherman who grew up in the quaint village of Tyre decides to get married and start a family. Realizing that his meager income of \$7 a day cannot support three children, he turns to ADR for a loan. In less than two weeks the fisherman secures a \$2,000 loan, purchases a small fishing boat and increases his daily income, seven fold. Not only will he be able to provide the basic necessities for his immediate family, but due to a trickle down effect, his extended family and the community at large will benefit as well.

Built on the conviction that poor people can be both reliable borrowers and avid entrepreneurs, ADR launched the Micro-Credit program in 1999. Small loans, ranging from \$300 to \$6,000, are offered to assist in self-employment projects that allow individuals, who do not qualify for traditional bank loans, to take care of themselves and their families. The purpose of the loan may be to buy a new tool to cultivate a profitable crop or to purchase merchandise to sell at local marketplaces. Regardless of the economic sector, which includes agriculture, fishing, industry, services, commerce and crafts, ADR provides financial services that shift the focus from day to day survival to a viable plan for the future.

ADR implemented its Micro-Credit program with the support of the European Union, and was the first in Lebanon to partner with a commercial bank – Bank Audi. Additional funds have been received from various public and private institutions, namely ESCWA, UNDP and USAID. Innovation has played a pivotal role in the development of the Association through its pioneering alliance with a standard banking facility and Lebanon's general mail facility Postal Service – Liban Post.

More than 2,600 small, self-sustaining businesses have been established since the start of the program with 75% of the loan recipients reporting a significant rise in income. Potential clients are between 18 and 60 years of age living or working in the cazas of Tyre, Saida, Nabatieh, Bint Jbeil, Marjayoun and Hasbaya. As each loan is paid back, usually within eighteen months, the recycling of funds revitalizes economic activity and encourages other developmental objectives such as savings, civic participation and education or training initiatives.



Sustainable access to microfinance helps alleviate poverty by generating income, creating jobs, allowing children to go to school, enabling families to obtain health care, and empowering people to make the choices that best serve their needs. VOCATIONAL TRAINING

ADR recognizes that local populations are a community's greatest asset. By facilitating their access to the labor market and developing specialized, marketable skills, a more economically viable community will be created for the benefit of present and future generations.

According to figures published by UNICEF, the deterioration of economic conditions in South Lebanon contributed to 30% of the population's non-enrollment in an educational institution. A low rate of higher education, coupled with the absence of a strong productive sector, has resulted in a weak and narrow job market. To curb the rate of unemployment and stimulate income-generating activities, ADR launched the Vocational Training program in 1998 as an economic development strategy to supplement its Micro-Credit program.

Five ADR centers were created in Tyre, Marjayoun, Kfar Kila, Tebnine and Aitaroun to serve as a focal point for disseminating information, providing education and training in partnership with private and public institutions – both locally and internationaly.



The program is organized under three modular sets:

TECHNICAL

Objective: To develop professional and interpersonal skills needed by small entrepreneurs

Topics Covered: Basic computer and language literacy, business management, basic accounting, vocational training (construction, carpentry, plumbing, bakery, electronics, beauty care, computer and cellular repair, etc).

CERTIFIED

Objective: To provide access to advanced studies to rural and low-income students, and thus improve their educational qualifications and employment opportunities.

Topics Covered: Intermediate and advanced literacy in computer and languages, secretarial studies, CST certification (governmental) on software development, accounting, cosmetics and tourism.

REMEDIAL

Objective: To reduce school failure, drop-outs and child labor. **Areas Covered:** Reinforcement classes for students in grades 6, 7 and 9, culture and leisure activities targeting working children, introduction of cash crops that do not require child labor and the training of qualified professionals. Students in ADR's courses range in age from 17 to 25 years. Young adults completing ADR's training program often find work in the local community and frequently apply for small loans under the Micro-Credit program, leading to individual entrepreneurship and self employment.

ADR has been able to put into practice an excellent working method which consists of developing activities answering to people's necessities and building their capacities.

AGRICULTURE

Poverty, especially in rural communities, places a heavy burden on natural resources. Studies have shown that growth in the aggregate output of crops was declining over the years due to a rapid degradation of the soil. Pesticide poisoning, soil depletion and loss of biological diversity were reasons for the implementation of ADR's good agricultural practices program and education regarding new technologies.

Agriculture constitutes the most vital economic sector in South Lebanon in terms of labor and revenue. By accelerating agricultural development, a reduction of poverty is achieved through growth. Thus, ADR, with the support of its international partners, launched its ground-breaking Sustainable Agricultural Program in 2000, with the creation of the CASUR center in Abbassiyeh.

Small farmers and agricultural cooperatives are provided with various activities and services to reduce production costs and improve the quality and quantity of produce, while providing benefits to the environment. Farmers can learn about new agricultural practices and regenerative techniques inspired by indigenous knowledge, rent low-cost agricultural tools and equipment, acquire post-harvest and cold storage services, buy organic compost, and receive technical assistance.

Given the identified constraints obstructing the development of the sector, ADR is working towards expanding the scope of agro-products grown, with specific emphasis on local endangered species and the support of agro-food processing.



Objectives:

- Reduce production costs while increasing production value.
 Provide technical and training
- support to farmers.
- Introduce farmers to alternative agricultural production and development programs for better individual and collective gain.
- Disseminate good farming practices.
- Support cooperative and business group activities to better market agro-production.
 Provide cost-effective equipment for small farmers.

ADR's Agricultural Program offers a variety of services aimed at decreasing the cost, while increasing the value of production, according to the needs of local communities through six main initiatives:

Cold storage and packing facility: Four split cold storage rooms with a total capacity of 550 tons for citrus, apples, and other fruits to be washed, waxed, graded and packed for local and international markets. The use of harvest-delaying chemicals and the cost of retail intermediation are thus reduced and the production capacity of the trees is improved. **Compost facility:** 1,000 tons of high-quality organic compost is produced by recycling and transforming banana plant residue for environmentally friendly agricultural use. Local raw material resources are used to lower the cost of production, reduce the usage of chemical fertilizers and improve soil fertility.

Nursery: For the production of aromatic and medicinal plants to introduce alternative agro-products and sustain indigenous species. **Demonstration plot:** For awareness and training sessions on advanced agricultural practices and schemes.

Agricultural machinery: Offering rental services of tractors, rotary cultivators and other agricultural equipment and tools to farmers at a reduced cost.

Technical assistance: Extension and technical training services are delivered to individual farmers and cooperatives.

SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

On the path towards alleviating poverty and community solidarity, ADR's Social Development Program is a key component for building the socio-economic capacities of the rural poor. Through guidance and assistance, ADR has worked to empower individuals and groups on a grass-roots level for the benefit of the region. The implementation of sustainable development projects, in collaboration with local partners, ensures that the program is both relevant to the communities' needs and inclusive of its participants.

Since 1998, ADR has supported the Al Baqa cooperative, a self-initiated socio-economic group of fisherman and their families, living in the direst of conditions. With no access to health care, government subsidies or the financial resources to tap into the region's recent construction boom, the population living in the old city quarters of Tyre has witnessed overcrowding, an unhealthy environment and the systematic decline of income. ADR, in partnership with Al Baqa, the Spanish Agency for International Cooperation, FPSC, and various local donors, has secured an area of land from the Greek Catholic Archdiocese of Tyre to provide homes for eighty families. The project has been one of the most successful to date and has served as a platform for developing various other productive, social and educational activities.

In November of 2002, a protocol of decentralized cooperation was signed between Provence, Alpes and Côtes d'Azur regions in France (PACA), ADR, and twenty-one municipalities in South Lebanon. The partnership offers a framework of structural cooperation, relying on the economic, scientific, tourism and cultural potentials of each region. Sustainable prosperity and peace has developed through practices and policies under the themes of territory management, building the capacities of the elected municipal councils, economic development,



After the war of 2006, the Southern Agricultural and Business Recovery (SABR) Program was launched, funded by USAID/OFDA, ANERA and and partnered with DIG and ADR to assist in the early recovery of South Lebanon. ADR administered cash grants to individual entrepreneurs, farmers and cooperatives, allowing for the refueling of livelihoods and income generation in the conflict-affected areas. The injection of cash helped Micro Credit clients resolve their outstanding financial obligations and renew their loans in order to revitalize economic activity. Humanitarian aid was given in terms of tents, water tanks, portable WCs and other relief material by utilizing the CASUR cold storage facility for storage and distribution services. Additionally, ADR provided vocational training to improve and develop technical and business skills that were needed to support the recovery process.

ADR has also carried out awareness campaigns on civil rights and provided support to social and training centers in refugee camps. Its solidarity fund offers medical and educational assistance to the disadvantaged population living in South Lebanon. ANERA has been very pleased with the performance of past projects, and therefore, proudly speaks of ADR as an on-going partner.
